SHARE Atlanta Joins March of Dimes Chairman's Club

SHARE Atlanta will be honored at the February 4 kickoff luncheon for the March of Dimes WalkAmerica 2005 as members of the Chairman's Club, which represents the top ten fundraising teams for the Downtown Atlanta walk in 2004 (*see p.3 for text of letter*). In addition to this honor, our team also received the "Most Improved" Award and 2nd Place out of teams with fewer than 100 employees for the 2004 walk, which begins and ends in Centennial Olympic Park each April.

2005 will mark the 50th anniversary of the Salk Polio vaccine and the third year of the March of Dimes Prematurity Campaign. Preventing premature births can help the March of Dimes put SHARE Atlanta out of business--wouldn't that be a dream come true!

February 4 also marks the beginning of our efforts to recruit walkers for our 2005 team and the start of fundraising. Last year we raised over \$17,000, largely with the March of Dimes internet fundraising tool. The March of Dimes found that walkers who used the internet option raised almost \$200 more on average than those who didn't, and it is much easierno more fiddling with envelopes of cash or awkward conversations with your sister-in-law. Just one mass e-mail, and those who wish to support you can do so.

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

I had the most wonderful moment with my sons after the Memorial Celebration this year. My oldest, Braxton, is 10 and was allowed to attend for the first time. He and his good friend, Kyle Renner, lit the candle together at the beginning of the ceremony. Afterwards our two families met for dinner, and our younger boys immediately began calculating the years until they would be able to participate as well. I loved seeing them talk so openly about the service, apparently unscarred by our families' losses.



I told him that every bad thing has something good that comes from it, even if the bad thing is very bad. I told him that we never would have known Kyle and Nathan (or Jaiko and Aja Celka or many other friends) had it not been for our babies. After all, they live in Stockbridge (or Suwannee or Woodstock) and we live in Alpharetta. How else would we have met? The shock of not knowing these friends who are so interwoven into the fabric of our life silenced him for a moment before he demanded to know "Who else is in on this?"

Just as Cullen couldn't picture his life without these friends, I cannot fathom mine without all of you. You have made it bearable, survivable, wonderful, inspiring, and a blessing. You are a gift from my children that I will always treasure.

Now, after ten years, it's time to let some fresh ink run across these pages. I am passing my pen but not saying goodbye. Please don't think you've heard the last of me.

And to all of you newly bereaved parents who can't imagine ever finding the purpose in all your pain, who can't begin to believe you will live through it, find a friend who understands your grief and support one another. I promise, it will be a blessing for both of you.


The love stays...

The Ceremony

The vessel placed before us symbolizes our hearts. When we conceived and when we lost our babies our hearts were flooded with emotions. Emotions of joy, happiness and wonderful dreams when we conceived, then emotions of grief, anger and extreme loss when our sweet baby died.

The water inside symbolizes the tears we each have cried. Some alone and some on the shoulders of our loved ones and friends. Our shared tears have become one tear for the many parents who suffer similar losses each day. The tears we shed gradually lead us to wisdom, strength, compassion and endurance.

One of God's creations, the rose with its thorns and lovely colors and fragrance, is a symbol of beauty and pain. Today our rose petals symbolize the sweetness of our babies. The white petals are our babies so soft and pure who are here with us today in our hearts. The pink petals are the love we have for our babies and the yellow rose petals are for the growing peace that we wish to find as we heal.

During the litany, as you come to receive your angel memento, let's join together in sharing the path toward peace as we place some rose petals in our vessel by the SHARE Atlanta Memorial Candle knowing that our special babies will beforever in our hearts..

1986: First Baby Reunion was in February and evolved to Family Reunions as members brought older children over the years.




1986: Informal inservices began and continued in the 90s with radio, television and newspaper coverage for advocacy and awareness.



Parenting our Babies...

SHARE Atlanta's Blanket of Love or Our "4B's" Mission "Wrapping our babies in love..."

SHARE Atlanta is pleased to announce a very special outreach project that is just unfolding. We believe this will blossom into a very special outreach for many different people over the next years.

Comfort is needed after the tragic loss of a baby...

This outreach is most special because it has been created in loving memory of two of our very own precious babies, Zachary and Jeremy Mishkoff who were born still to Kelly and Alan Mishkoff in 2004. In her loss of their sons, Kelly had expressed how comforting it was to hold her sons in blankets that the hospital provided. Jennifer Carter, Kelly's close friend, visited me in an effort to explore possible ideas to support this family and other SHARE Atlanta families. Jennifer introduced me to the idea of making tiny sized fleece blankets for babies who would be held for a brief time while "bittersweet hellos and sad good-byes" are said.

Special mementos..

These blankets will be given to the parent as a special remembrance of their baby to help comfort them in their journey for healing.

These soft, baby patterned, fleece blankets will have our heart logo on them. A small card recognizing the person or group who made them, and SHARE Atlanta as the group donating it, will be attached. Jennifer is willing to teach some of our mothers and the women from CareShare senior centers (who lovingly make our memorial boxes) how to create these easily made blankets. We will have a workshop to kick-off this project on February 19 from 10:30-1:30 at Marcia's home.

In November, Sharon Gregory, nurse and long time friend from Dekalb Medical, had shown me tiny baby clothes that they have had given to them, and my mind took off! In considering the broader possibilities of these combined ideas, I have named our project "the 4B's,, which is short for "Blankets of Love...Buntings, Bonnets, and Booties." I have found patterns for making simple crocheted, knitted, quilted, or sewn baby blankets, buntings, booties and bonnets that are designed for this very purpose.

The blessing of hand making these blankets...

Mary Beth, mom of Mikaela, wrote to me, "While it was a bit hard to make a blanket knowing that it wasn't going to be for my baby, somehow it helped me knowing that I might be helping another family who just went through what I did. Making the blankets was more therapeutic for me than I could have imagined."

This is a project that you can do from the comfort of your home or join us at the senior center or one of our work shops that we will be holding. Healing comes from outreach and mutually supporting one another. Now, thanks to Jennifer and Sharon, and in memory of Zachary and Jeremy and your own special baby, another door has been opened for our parents. I wrote "The Climb" eleven years ago after the loss of my second child to miscarriage. Looking back at my path through grief, I still find that the analogy holds true.

During our climb, the people we love have waited and prayed for our return. They have wished that we never started up that mountain, fearful that we might fall and be irretrievably broken, not knowing that only the climb itself could help us put the pieces of our hearts and souls back together. They miss the people we used to be, finding the newer version just a little hard to accept.

In my time as a volunteer for SHARE Atlanta, I have lingered near the bottom of the mountain, waiting to help other climbers reach it safely. There is a wariness in those who know me when they realize this. I think they wonder when I will be completely free of this task, and find it hard to understand why I would embrace it, share stories of my trek, and feel connected to others who have made the journey. Family members of other bereaved parents are uncertain of my role and motives as well. They wonder if I would be needed to help them down at all if I hadn't encouraged them up there to begin with!

In the end, I think I have made my way up and down the mountain of grief for the same reason given by those who climb Mt. Everest - because it's there. My grief was there whether I chose to

face it or not. Ignoring it would not make it crumble. Only through the difficult but necessary journey can we find our way to hope and healing, and be forever changed by the process.

They say grief is a depth that you sink to, But I have to disagree. Grief is a mountain you climb and climb Away from how life used to be.

Slowly you leave all your loved ones behind, And all they can do is just stare. They know they can't reach you, and higher you climb, forgetting just how much they care.

Once at the top you sit and you sob, And look at the world with new eyes. Everyone else's problems seem small While yours are as wide as the sky.

The choice now is yours, are you willing to risk The treacherous trip to the ground? Though you know you may fall and get hurt once again, It's worth it to finally come down.

You could stay at the top till your broken heart stops, And finally you no longer live From fear, lack of trust, and the absence of love That the ones on the ground used to give.

So you take a tentative step now and then, And soon to your wonder and joy, The ones on the ground reach up, help you down, And support you the rest of the way.

I wish many things that I'd done, thought or said, I wish for the way things could be.
But the wish that I wish with all of my heart
Is for Jamie to be here with me.





What I Have Learned -by Lynne Anderson

Last July, 2004, my first born son would have been 20 years I've learned that it's hard to be patient. old.

Twenty years old!! I have to shake my head in disbelief. I cannot possibly be old enough to have a 20 year old child! Then again, I realize I am not the same person I was when he was born and I was 25. I'd like to think I have 20 more vears of maturity under my belt. I'd like to believe I've learned a few things about life, and unfortunately, about and death.

While I was putting my daughters to bed tonight, two daughters who would not be here had it not been for the deaths of their older brothers. I made an inventory of life's lessons in grief. I realized that a lot of the important things I've learned about life I've learned since the deaths of my first two sons. I've also learned so much from the many. many bereaved parents who came through the couples group that I led for 11 years.

I have learned that bad things do happen to good people.

I have learned that when it's YOUR baby and YOUR body, statistics don't matter.

I have learned that lightening can strike more than once in the same place.

I have learned that life is not fair and no one ever said it would be.

I have learned that even the best of friends cans say the worst things.

I have learned that society gives us about 3 weeks to grieve.

I have learned that the stages of grief do not necessarily come in order.

I have learned that shock, denial, anger, sadness, despair and acceptance come and go for a long time.

I have learned that religions don't necessarily help us grieve, but faith does.

I have learned that time doesn't heal all wounds, it's what you do with the time that makes the difference.

I have learned that even the best husbands cannot read minds.

I have learned that if men cannot fix it, they see no need to dwell on it.

I have learned that men's grief is often overlooked.

I have learned that talking can help, but there's nothing like talking to someone who's "been there."

I have learned that most of us are stronger and more resilient than we give ourselves credit for.

I have learned that anger is both normal and scary.

I have learned that although some aspects of grief are universal, we all grieve differently.

I have learned that we can complicate our grief by wasting time trying to make others know how we feel.

I have learned that some people will never understand the depth of our sadness.

I have learned that help, support and understanding can come from the most unexpected places and people.

I have learned that you never "get over" a loss, but incorporate it into who and what you become.

I have learned that there is no such thing as "closure." The memory of our loss will always be there, and that it's OK to revisit it from time to time for the rest of our lives. Revisiting, in itself, can be healing.
